## **Commemorating the International** Day of Older Persons with a Workshop on Dementia

On September 30 experts in elder care from Oaknoll retirement community conducted a workshop at ICSC (Iowa City Senior Center) on how to be a dementia friend. In commemoration of the International Day of Older Persons, October 1, JCUNA board member Merce Bern-Klug and her colleagues in the UI Aging Studies Program organized the event. Following a training workbook from Dementia Friends Iowa, an affiliate of a national organization, those of us in attendance received clear definitions of what dementia is (caused by one of several diseases of the brain, most notably but not only Alzheimer's) and what it is not (a normal part of aging).

Listening to the trainers and moving through the

worksheet brought into sharper focus interactions I have had, or have, with others experiencing early and advanced dementia. Questions of other participants suggested they were having similar experiences. If we at least begin by speaking of "living with dementia" rather than "suffering from dementia," we will have learned one key lesson from the workshop to pass on. Participants walked away from the event with the session workbook and a list of Iowa Dementia Resources and received later a certificate as a Dementia Friend, a designation I aspire to live up to. ## **International Day of Peace**

Bijou Maliabo, a member of the Iowa City Human Rights Commission and the JCUNA Board, delivered the following remarks at our celebration of the International Day of Peace, September 20, at Mercer Park.

International Day of Peace is important to recognize each year and the ongoing issues we face throughout the world. Violence, Racism, injustice & Inequality to mention a few.

I believe it's important to understand that these issues are only temporary if we choose to take action and pursue both Social Justice & Racial Equity in communities and throughout the globe.

I first came to the United States in [1998] from The Democratic Republic of Congo with a goal to seek peace. As an Immigrant/Refugee from a country where war ravaged and has been a war zone since 1996, nicknamed "Africa's First World War," I have witnessed how the influence of racism and the pursuit of violence and injustice willfully leads towards the denial of basic human rights.

I know that I speak for everyone at this peaceful event when I say that everyone in this world deserves the right to live their life with a sense of freedom, security, and safety. I know this to be true because building and maintaining a culture of peace is both a shared goal and challenge for mankind. Peace can only be fully realized when there is justice. Injustice breeds ignorance, hatred, sorrow, and misery. There will be no end to violence and racism until there is justice. Justice is peace, justice is fairness, justice is equality, justice is human rights, justice is freedom.

With everyone working collectively, our mission is to eliminate racism and injustice and bring about a peaceful world for everyone because there cannot be peace without justice.

In closing, I wanted to leave you with one last thought. As a citizen of this world, understanding global problem and living in peace is all about accepting differences, having the ability to know, to listen, to recognize, to respect, to appreciate and to educate others. We all have a role to play in fostering peace because peace is a DUTY. The United Nations General Assembly has declared this as a day one devoted to that duty.

In honor of that declaration, I ask that you join me in making a commitment to help end racism and building a better future full of countries and communities that belongs to all people without distinction of race, gender, ethnicity, language, or religion. Remember, that this commitment takes more than listening; it requires action. We need to take COURAGE to denounce wrong by building PEACE.
